Adiantum formosum



Adiantum formosum: Giant Maidenhair.

Family: Adiantaceae

Genus: Adiantum from the Greek adianos (dry or non-wettable), referring to the water-shedding nature of the lamina.

Species: from Latin *formosus* (beautiful) in reference to the fronds.

Fronds are up to 180 cm long with the stipe up to 90 cm long. It is a vigorous and widespreading fern. Its rhizome is usually deeply buried, sometimes to a depth of 30-60 cm., a feature unique among Australian species. In the wild, along creeks and alluvial flats, they spread over large areas, the shiny black stipes and graceful fronds making a beautiful sight.
